SUBJECT: 2012 Summer Youth Employment Program Updates

RECOMMENDATION:

- **Review progress on 2012 Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP) Planning and take action as needed.**

DISCUSSION: 2012 SYEP Planning: The workgroup has developed a marketing plan and fundraising strategies for a program that can be continuously funded by local resources. The current business champions for SYEP are Ron Slack for Good Times and Carol Siegel for the Santa Cruz Seaside Company. The Youth Council continues to be grateful for their participation, passion, and generosity in providing leadership for the development of a community-based and locally-funded program.

The SYEP Workgroup has been hard at work to raise the \$300,000 that will be needed to fund 100 youth for the summer of 2012. The following are some of the steps being taken:

- Through the annual Good Times Community Fund for local community programs in partnership with the Community Foundation of Santa Cruz County, Ron Slack has included the Summer Youth Employment Program to help *make a difference*. Contributions will be matched dollar to dollar by funds provided by the David and Lucille Packard Foundation. Contributions will be accepted through January 13, 2012.
- A power point presentation has been developed for two types of audiences (civic organizations and businesses), and Ron Slack and Carol Siegel amongst others, are taking this show on the road to ask for donations and participation by hiring a youth. Both civic organization and businesses are being approached, and a business list continues to be developed. If you have any suggestions on businesses to contact the Workgroup would appreciate your asking the business directly or letting JoAnn Allen know the name and contact of the business.
- Obtained a fundraising event coordinator, Sarah Ferguson, through a contract with the Santa Cruz County Office of Education. She will be coordinating "The Arts 4 Summer Work" showcase of youth talent scheduled for **May 19, 2012** at the Crocker Center at Cabrillo College. The youth talent show will include high school and college students. Auditions and rehearsals are planned in advance of this event at Cabrillo College. The event will include a VIP reception, a silent auction, possible raffle, and gifts for youth talent winners. There are six genres: dance, music solos, bands, theatrical performances, stand-up comedy, and Glee. Tandy Beal is being asked to be a host for the evening but is not yet confirmed.

- Obtained volunteer services of David Fowler, a marketing consultant through Ron Slack. David is working with Sarah developing a marketing plan, timelines, and materials for the event. Also, working with COE County Arts Coordinator for Arts in School program. A flyer has been developed for high school and college administrators and teachers. A flyer will be developed specifically to go out to youth.
- Marketing plan includes television, radio, print campaign, and support ads. Some of these will be bilingual in Spanish, especially for recruitment of youth talent.
- A new name has been developed for the website that is under development: summer WORK4youth.org. Ron Slack was able to get Cruzio to donate the website access for free.
- Local celebrities such as James Durbin or Chris Renee are being asked to participate. If you have any connections with these folks please let Ron Slack know.
- COE Sueños staff is working with program youth, foster youth, alternative education, and Regional Occupational Programs (ROP) to develop a 90 second marketing video that will be displayed at local theaters, possibly placed on community TV station, and posted on the website.
- Volunteers are needed to serve on the various Workgroup committees such as the silent auction, ticketing, donations (food, wine or champagne, chocolates, money), prizes (some ideas such as Chardonnay boat trip for winner and friends, AT&T tickets for games with friends, O'Neill Odyssey educational boat trip with friends, etc), raffle (prizes may include student and teacher art work donations), and to help out the evening of the event.
- Youth Resources Bank (YRB) has established a new account called YRB6, and has a 5% charge to offset CPA costs for general accounting purposes. All YRB members are volunteers and there is no staff in this nonprofit organization.

NEXT STEPS AND ACTION:

- WIB Board and Youth Council members are being encouraged to participate, volunteer, donate, inform other businesses in the community, and commit to hiring a youth.
- Assist in the development of donor base by asking donors on a one-to-one ask, or by providing names of potential business and contact.

Summer Youth Employment Program

Rare opportunities foster growth and life skills

Back in 2009, when MaryAnn Moya was 22 years old, the world was her oyster. Unfortunately for her and many other people her age, she was entering the workforce at the worst possible time—during the peak of the recession.

But with the economic downturn, came a glimmer of hope: the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act. The stimulus plan allotted \$1.3 million to the Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP), a division of the Santa Cruz County Office of Education (CoE) designed to provide young people ages 14 to 24 from low-income households with career training and life skills, at job sites around town.



During the first summer of the program, Moya learned about working for an insurance company and how to handle payroll. “It was wonderful to learn new and different stuff,” she says. “It’s a great opportunity.”

Today, Moya is a full-time employee at the CoE, where she works in the Student Support Services department, and is a member of the School Attendance Review Board—a job opportunity that came about following the completion of her time with the SYEP.

“Once the hours were over, I wanted to volunteer [with the program],” she explains. “But the people here said, ‘you’re doing a great job, why don’t you keep working here?’”

A poster child for the program and what its participants can achieve with hard work, Moya is an inspiration to many young people currently in the SYEP, which is now working hard to stay afloat despite a lack of stimulus funds.

“When we received funding through ARRA, we hit the ground running,” says JoAnn Allen, manager at the CoE. “The first year, we had 360 youth participants, and over two summers we’ve had a total of about 900. But that was when it was fully funded with government dollars—when ARRA went away, jobs went away.”

This past summer was the first time that the SYEP ran without the help of government dollars, and, as a result, could support only 70 participants, with many staff members volunteering their time. “I had to turn away a lot of families and youth,” says Allen. “A lot of youth who need this support are not eligible, but the need is still there.”

Allen believes that interest in the program is so high because of the life lessons learned during each participant's 120 hours of summer employment.

"For me, it wasn't just about giving them a job—it's not just money in hand—it's about dreams," explains Allen. "My husband and I came from humble beginnings, so we know that for many of these kids the money is not used to simply buy things, but to help their families. [The program] is a reason to be reengaged in school—now they know they need a degree."

Creating good relationships with work sites around town is key to the success of the program, which has enabled participants to receive hands-on work experience in the fields of medicine, law enforcement, hospitality, real estate, journalism, construction, and more, based on their interests.

For 18-year-old Jesus Aguilera, a program participant since the beginning of June, the SYEP has afforded him the opportunity to learn about camerawork, scripting, interviewing, and creating vignettes at Community Television of Santa Cruz County.

"It's been really great—I've got to learn many new things, like how to edit and record videos professionally," says Aguilera. "We've done three interviews so far: one with Joe Ferrara who owns a comic-book shop, one with a professor at UCSC, and one with a boxer in Watsonville."

Aguilera believes video editing will just be a fun hobby—he's thinking about a career in criminology—but he recommends the SYEP to all young people who could use some guidance. "It's a good experience," he says.

Though local businesses and the Youth Resource Bank—a local nonprofit that financially supports youth in need and manages the SYEP's funds—have helped keep the program running without government aid, the qualifications for program participants have greatly reduced the size of the eligible applicant pool.

Today, participants must be age 14 to 24, meet the 200 percent poverty requirement, and have the right to work in Santa Cruz County. The cost of sponsoring one youth to participate in the program is \$3,000, which covers subsidies, clothing, bus passes, a job readiness workshop, and whatever else their job training requires. For \$100, one youth can get bus passes for a month. \$500 provides clothing and equipment for one participant.

"This is subsidized work with meaning," says Allen, who encourages anyone who wants to make a difference in the lives of at-risk youth to get involved. "It's so important to invest in young people." | **Jenna Brogan**

SUBJECT: Labor Market Information: Employment/Unemployment Information

This item provides a review of Santa Cruz labor market information (Updated November 2011)

The unemployment rate in the Santa Cruz County was 10.1 percent in October 2011, up from a revised 10.0 percent in September 2011, and below the year-ago estimate of 10.8 percent. This compares with an unadjusted unemployment rate of 11.2 percent for California and 8.5 percent for the nation during the same period.
