<p>Please provide a brief description of your agency/organization: (including mission, work-based learning opportunities offered, type of youth population served, age and income requirements)</p> <p>Above the Line – Group Home Society’s mission is to end homelessness for minors in Santa Cruz County who are willing and able to change the circumstances of their lives.</p> <p>Our two therapeutic homes serve at-risk teens ages 14 – 18. We assist young people in their efforts to nurture themselves, increase their self-esteem and develop respect and mutual support in relationships with others within a home-like environment with professionally trained staff. Our programs provide a climate of safety and security that is essential for independent living as young adults and systemic efforts at either family reunification or successful foster family experiences.</p> <p>Homes for Kids and Intensive Treatment Foster Care are two arms of ATL – GHS that specifically serve the needs of the foster child. Homes for Kids works with placing agencies, therapists, foster and biological parents to provide services that promote the healthy development for children aged 3 – 18. Intensive Treatment Foster Care proactively collaborates with county placement workers with specially trained foster family homes to best match the needs of the more difficult to place child. ITFC provides weekly foster care check in, on-going emotional support, 24 extra hours a week of support counselor involvement, individualized treatment plans, pre-certification training and weekly therapy.</p> <p>The Kashtan Vocational Center is a new program slated to begin in the summer of 2004. The focus of the center is hospitality and food preparation. Kashtan will initially be geared toward ATL – GHS graduates.</p>

X	Alternative Secondary School	The Dewitt-Andersen and Corralitos Oaks School are alternative secondary schools operated for at-risk and homeless teens.
X	Mentoring services for the period of activity and post-service for a period of not less than 12 months	Mentoring is provided while the youth are in the programs. We do not provide service after graduation or departure from Above the Line.
X	Leadership Development	All of the teens are encouraged in Leadership Development through counseling, communication and life skills, after school activities and peer relationships.

The recruiter visits local high schools and community agencies to inform students about college, financial aid, vocational programs, transfer etc. Once a student is deemed eligible based on income, and academic status, they must be enrolled in 12 units to receive some of the other services such as: a grant, counseling, peer advising, early registration, tutoring etc.</p>

This is accomplished by connecting and providing people with resources and services, supporting opportunities for personal and cultural exchange, and helping residents to thrive by helping themselves and each other. The LOFRC is a *friendly* place where *all* people of *all* cultures feel welcome and respected.

The Live Oak Family Resource Center offers a variety of services for the Live Oak Community, such as: birth preparation classes, play groups for families with children ages 0-5, home visits for families with children ages 0-5, and information and referral.

Our family advocacy program is funded through a grant in collaboration with the Santa Cruz County Juvenile Hall and the Live Oak Family Resource Center. The youth population must be Live Oak residents and on probation. The ages of our youth range from 13-18. There are no minimum income requirements.

Presently, the Live Oak Family Resource Center provides a place for our youth to complete community service hours or to do volunteer work jointly with the Youth Community Restoration program. The advocacy program provides intensive case management with each one of our program participants. In the past, 2 Live Oak youth participated in culinary arts program, graduated the program and have been offered paid internships. Live Oak Family Resource Center advocates during culinary arts program, provided transportation, attended class scheduling, facilitated materials distributed by class instructor, provided support with media reporting. This is an example of the support Live Oak Family Resource center advocates provide. The Live Oak Family Resource Center is working on making the center more visible to our youth. In the future we are planning to have activities that will be more inviting to youth.

Our approach is a positive one, offering students the experience of working side-by-side with community volunteers, and the chance to be treated as a peer by adults.

Caminos places expelled students in a six-week internship cycle (based upon their interests and strengths) in local agencies, holding weekly reflective meetings and culminating in a public recognition ceremony complete with certificates and letters of reference. Students needing more hours can repeat cycles.

The purpose of Teen Peer Court is to divert first offender juveniles from the more formal Juvenile Court. Developed as part of the Santa Cruz County Juvenile Justice System, high school students convene as a court and determine the appropriate judgment for each case referred from the Santa Cruz County Probation Department and School Resource Officers. These are real cases. Teens have admitted the underlying offense and have elected to be judged by their peers. Teen Peer Court is based upon the premise that youthful offenders will more readily accept responsibility for their actions when judged and sentenced by their peers.

The Santa Cruz County Teen Peer court reaches over 2000 youth annually through youth participation as jurors, attorneys, clerks, bailiffs, youth offenders and courtroom observers. Youth involved with Teen Peer Court are part of a live civics lesson. They develop public speaking skills, practice problem solving, determine legally binding sanctions for their peers, fulfill community service hours, and have the opportunity to experience job shadowing/mentoring from members of the justice community.
